# Young Scholars' Forum in Chinese Studies 2024

The Young Scholars' Forum in Chinese Studies 2024, co-organized by The Chinese University of Hong Kong—Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation Asia-Pacific Centre for Chinese Studies (CCK-APC) and the Institute of Chinese Studies (ICS), was held on 23—25 May 2024 at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK).

To celebrate its 10th anniversary, the Forum welcomed young scholars from around the world, including past participants. A total number of 333 applications were received, including 287 first-time applications: 47 from Hong Kong, 126 from Mainland China, seven from Australia, 36 from



North America, 37 from Europe, and 34 from other Asian countries and regions; and 46 applications from past participants: four from Hong Kong, 24 from Mainland China, one from Australia, four from North America, five from Europe, and eight from other Asian countries and regions.

After a thorough review of the two groups of applications, 41 young scholars were selected and invited to present at the Forum. Among them, 25 were new to the Forum (five from Hong Kong, five from Mainland China, six from other Asian countries, and nine from Europe, North America, and Australia), while 16 were returning participants (one from Hong Kong, five from Mainland China, five from other Asian countries, and five from Europe, North America, and Australia).

The Forum aims to nurture young scholars in Chinese Studies and strengthen their academic networks. With the theme "Chinese Studies across Disciplines: Nature, Culture, and Social Life", this year's Forum was conducted in a hybrid format, drawing an audience of about 120 people including CUHK colleagues, students, alumni, and the public.

The papers were divided into thirteen panels scheduled over a period of three days. Topics of interest include but are not restricted to:

- 1. Nature and environment in Chinese socio-cultural life
- 2. Sustainability and Chinese Studies
- 3. Chinese thought and its global influences
- 4. Nature in Chinese literature, art, philosophy, and so on
- 5. The impact of science and technology on Chinese Studies
- 6. Chinese perspectives and approaches to the Anthropocene, and to the ideas of posthumanism, object-oriented ontology, ecocriticism, etc.
- 7. The everyday and the mundane in the Chinese world

Esteemed professors from both CUHK and other universities were invited to serve as discussants. CUHK faculty members include Prof. Cui Wendong and Prof. Hoyan Hang Fung from the Department of Chinese Language and Literature, Prof. Lai Chi Tim and Prof. Lai Tsz Pang from the Department of Cultural and Religious Studies, Prof. Poon Suk Wah and Prof. Puk Wing Kin from the Department of History, Prof. Lai Ming Chiu and Dr. Ye Jia from CCK-APC, and Prof. Li Chen from the Centre for China Studies. External moderators include Prof. Chen Fong Fong from the Department of Digital Arts and Creative Industries at Linguan University, Prof. Hon Tze Ki from Research Centre for History and Culture at Beijing Normal University at Zhuhai, and Prof. Tsui Lik Hang from the Department of Chinese and History at the City University of Hong Kong.

## **International Symposium on Silk Road Linguistics**

With a history spanning thousands of years, the Silk Road has witnessed the evolution of the languages and dialects used by countries and regions along its route and fostered their contact. The International Symposium on Silk Road Linguistics, organized by T.T. Ng Chinese Language Research Centre (CLRC) of the Institute of Chinese Studies at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK), took place on 30–31 May 2024, bringing together nearly a hundred participants to actively discuss linguistics research topics along the Silk Road.

The opening ceremony of the Symposium was graced by the presence of Prof. Alan K.L. Chan, Provost of CUHK, who delivered the opening address. Prof. Tang Sze Wing, Director of CLRC, delivered the welcoming address. The seven keynote speakers were from China, Finland, France, Germany, Kazakhstan, and the United States, namely Prof. Benjamin Brosig (Nazarbayev University), Prof. Hilary Chappell (École des hautes études en sciences sociales/CUHK), Prof. Yen-hui Audrey Li (University of Southern California), Dr. Erika Sandman (Helsinki University), Prof. Shuangcheng Wang (Shanghai Normal University), Prof. Dan Xu (Johannes Gutenberg University Mainz), and Prof. Yonglong Yang (Chinese Academy of Social Sciences).

The Symposium featured four parallel sessions, where over forty scholars shared their research and insights on topics such as phonology, lexicology, grammar, sociolinguistics, and language contact. The presentations sparked lively discussions among participants. The presenters demonstrated a diverse representation, including France, Japan, Morocco, and a wide range of provinces, autonomous regions, municipalities, and a special administrative region of China, namely Beijing, Tianjin, Inner Mongolia, Liaoning, Shanghai, Jiangsu, Henan, Guangdong, Sichuan, Shaanxi, Gansu, Xinjiang, and Hong Kong.

This Symposium built on the success of the Maritime Silk Road Suite, the first international linguistics event devoted to the 21st Century Maritime Silk Road under the Belt and Road Initiative, which was organized by CLRC in 2017. According to Prof. Tang, the previous event focused on the Maritime Silk Road and the current Symposium covering the Silk Road Economic Belt together provide a complete picture of the linguistic research along the Belt and Road routes. He hoped that these events could serve as a platform to boost the visibilities of the findings on language phenomena in specific regions, enhance exchanges in relevant studies, and broaden the academic community's understanding of the Belt and Road Initiative.

The International Symposium on Silk Road Linguistics, sponsored by the CUHK Research Summit Series, is one of the academic events celebrating the 60th anniversary of CUHK.



## **Greater Bay Area Forum on Chinese Grammar**

The Greater Bay Area Forum on Chinese Grammar was held on 26 June 2024 at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK), bringing together scholars from the area to explore a wide range of topics in Chinese grammar by sharing their research findings and insights. The Forum was organized by T.T. Ng Chinese Language Research Centre (CLRC) of the Institute of Chinese Studies at CUHK and co-organized by Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao University Alliance for Chinese (GHMUAC).

Linguists from the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (GBA) universities were invited as speakers, including (in alphabetical order) Prof. Dun Deng (CUHK), Prof. Yang Gu (CUHK, Shenzhen), Prof. Jianhua Hu (Guangdong University of Foreign Studies), Prof. Huayong Lin (Sun Yat-sen University), Prof. Danqing Liu (Shenzhen University), Prof. Haihua Pan (CUHK), Prof. Jingmin Shao (Jinan University), Prof. Dingxu Shi (Guangdong University of Foreign Studies), Prof. Jie Xu (University of Macau), and Prof. Chunli Zhao (Jinan University). The presentations covered both general and applied linguistic issues, sparking lively discussions.

The research on Chinese grammar within the GBA, according to Prof. Tang Sze Wing, Director of CLRC, is known for its openness and diverse theoretical approaches, with a particular focus on crosslanguage and cross-dialect comparison. He hoped the Forum could help boost the profile and influence of insightful regional research while stimulating further discussions on teaching and studying Chinese grammar in the face of growing technological challenges. Furthermore, Prof. Tang emphasized the essence of strengthening basic research in this field, including encouraging more students and young scholars to get involved in the subject and achieve a thorough understanding of the Chinese language through proper

methodology. Additionally, raising public awareness about the impact of Chinese grammar research would be necessary. Overall, the Forum served as a useful platform for promoting exchange and discussions on the development of Chinese grammar studies in the region.



## The 10th Inter-Regional Forum on Dialectal Grammar

The 10th Inter-Regional Forum on Dialectal Grammar was held on 27–28 June 2024 at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK). Organized by the T.T. Ng Chinese Language Research Centre (CLRC) of the Institute of Chinese Studies at CUHK, the Forum featured a keynote speech by Prof. Yen-hui Audrey Li (CUHK/University of Southern California). Over 30 presenters were selected through a call for papers to share their findings at the Forum. They are from 15 institutions, including (in alphabetical order) Beijing Language and Culture University, Beijing Normal University, Chinese Academy of Social Sciences, CUHK, Fudan University, Guangdong University of Foreign Studies, Hainan Normal University, Huazhong University of Science and Technology, Jinan University, Peking University, Renmin University of China, Shanghai Jiao Tong University, Sun Yat-sen University, Xiamen University, and Zhejiang University.

The discussions were conducted under the theme of "the sentence-final de in Chinese dialects" and covered Min, Yue, Wu, Ke, Gan, and Northern dialects. According to Prof. Tang Sze Wing, Director of CLRC, it is impossible to address all issues concerning the sentence-final particle de in two days. He hoped that this Forum could serve as a starting point to help scholars deepen their understanding of this phenomenon and uncover more new research questions.

The 11th Inter-Regional Forum on Dialectal Grammar will be held in 2025 at Sun Yat-sen University with the tentative theme of "the sentence-final clusters of functional words in Chinese dialects". Interested parties are advised to stay tuned for updates.

## Wet Guangzhou: Seasonality in a Southern Chinese City, 1820s–1880s

The Lingnan Culture Studies Public Lecture & Research Paper Competition 2023 Award Ceremony, organized by the Research Programme for Lingnan Culture, Institute of Chinese Studies, CUHK, was held on 25 April 2024 and drew over a hundred CUHK colleagues and students, alumni, and members of the public. Studies Research Paper Competition 2023 aims to promote international academic research on Lingnan culture, as well as to encourage local and overseas doctoral students and postdoctoral fellows who are aspiring to conduct in-depth research in the field. The competition received 30 research papers, which are subject to assessment by the selection committee and eight award winners were selected.

Prof. Steven B. Miles, Head and Professor of the Division of Humanities of the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology, was invited as the keynote speaker to deliver a talk on an interesting topic "Wet Guangzhou: Seasonality in a Southern Chinese City, 1820s–1880s" at the award ceremony. The lecture is part of a larger project on the rhythms of urban life in the southern Chinese port city of Guangzhou (Canton) during the nineteenth century. Through his analysis of wet-season disasters (flooding and storms), in contrast to dry-season disasters (fires), Prof. Miles conveyed a sense of the lived experience of city residents and revealed both how life was changing over the course of this transformative century and how observers perceived these changes in the lecture. His lecture, delivered in an engaging and accessible manner, was an inspiration to researchers as well as to the public.




